#### OC REGISTER MAKES HISTORICAL ERROR

On Sunday January 15th the day after our January meeting, the Orange County Register had an article on page 14 of the news section about the inauguration with questions related to the history of this event.

One of the question they asked was "What month was George Washington sworn in?" They answered "Inaugurations were held on March 4 until 1933 when the ratification of the 20th Amendment changed the date to Jan. 20. Before modern communications became available, four months were needed to tally the electoral votes. The amount of time became a nuisance for incoming administrations needing to handle problems arising in the nation." The insinuation here is that George Washington was inaugurated on March 4th. For his second term that answer would be correct, but what about his first term?

Due to the distance from Mount Vernon to New York City and the need to get his affairs at Mount Vernon in order before he left, George Washington did not arrive in New York City until late April. So it happened at Federal Hall on April 30, 1789 that George Washington was inaugurated as our first President under the newly approved Constitution.

#### CITIZENSHIP CERTIFICATE

Recently it was learned by Compatriot Jim Blauer that one of the members at his workplace

had just become an American Citizen (January 18). Jim was able to get her name and was able to fill out the SAR Citizenship Certificate to be presented to her. All Jim needs is the signature of the chapter president and he will be able to make the presentation to one of our newest American Citizens. This Jim hopes to get at the February meeting.

Do you know of a person or persons who have become American Citizens? Would you like to present them with an SAR Citizenship Certificate? If so, you can give Jim the name of the individual and the date on which they received their Citizenship and he can fill out one of these certificates, have President Beall sign it and it will be ready for presentation to one of our newest Naturalized Citizens.

“Many are born but few are chosen” seems an appropriate quote here as we Americans are all the better off for these new citizens having chosen to be Americans.

#### UPCOMING EVENTS

Then comes one of the biggest activity our chapter participates in each year. The Massing of the Colors and Tribute to our Armed Forces celebrating the birth of George Washington and honoring our Armed Forces.

The largest celebration of its kind in the western United States, 2017 will be the 35th annual celebration of George Washington's birth sponsored by the Sons of Liberty Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution! This upcoming event will be held at 3:00 PM, Sunday, February 19, 2017, at Hall of Liberty, Forest Lawn Hollywood Hills, 6300 Forest Lawn Drive, Los Angeles. Previous Massing of the Colors have been a great success. Over 600 people and fifty color guards participate each year, including over ten of our brother SAR Chapters. Many greater Los Angeles area high school and college color guards take part in this celebration. Forest Lawn might initially seem a strange place for this event, but it offers an area that

showcases a collection of American architecture and artworks that honor our country. There's the world's largest historical mosaic, The Birth of Liberty, a faithful reproduction of Boston's Old North Church, and larger-than-life-sized bronze statues of Washington and Jefferson. You can watch a free 26-minute movie about the American Revolution as well.

This event is open to the public, so all members, their family and friends are invited to attend this very spectacular display of patriotism.

### HAPPY ANNIVERSARY

As we enter our 50th year of our chapter, your editor will try to remember to place an item or items from our history books in your chapter's newsletter.

The first two items show Independence Hall at Knott's Berry Farm and Walter Knott as the first recipient of an SAR chapter award. A Commendation for his "exemplary Americanism".

According to the Buena Park News-Independent of January 17, 1968, there was a small article announcing the Orange County Chapter SAR would hold its first annual dinner meeting on Tuesday evening of February 13th. This was held at Knott's Berry Farm in a private dining room.

"At this meeting an outstanding citizenship award will be presented to two well known residents of Orange County by Dr. William Fort, president of the Orange County Chapter."

"George H. Todt, the state president of the SAR, will be the featured speaker of the evening."

"Any member of the SAR and interested residents in the area are cordially invited to attend. Reservations made be made with Mary Shively at the Americanism Educational League which is located in Freedom Hall at Knott's Berry Farm."

This article appeared not only in the Buena Park newspaper but also in the local papers of Fullerton, Garden Grove, Huntington Beach, Orange and La Mirada.

The gentlemen honored that night were Adolf Schoepe and Otto Evans. They were the first to receive awards from the newly created Orange County Chapter, SAR.

### COMPATRIOT CHARLES BEAL RECEIVES AWARD

On January 23, 2017 The Mojave Chapter #62 (in Fullerton) of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution

awarded Charles Beal the Excellence in Community Service Award. The purpose of the award is to recognize unpaid voluntary community service, which contributes to the community in an outstanding manner through cultural, educational, humanitarian, patriotic, historical, citizenship, or environmental conservation endeavors. His service has been recommended by the local chapter, by the California State DAR, and approved by the National Society that was started last summer when he was approached by Linda Moore, the Community Service Chairman. She was only aware of my Civil War Veteran graves project, but I updated her with the new project of locating Spanish American War Veteran graves and just recently Mexican War Veteran graves. It was presented at a ceremony by the Mojave Chapter DAR in the attendance of 60 ladies. Charles gave a brief speech about his projects and mentioned that he was a member of the SAR, Orange County Chapter.



### KING GEORGE III PAPERS RELEASED

The longest-reigning king in English history, King George III, is getting a new, public inspection after the British Royal Archives released a massive trove of documents made under his rule to the internet.

"Seeing original documents is utterly compelling," said Royal Archives librarian Oliver Urquhart Irvine. "You can feel the passion, personali-

ty, worries and triumphs of individuals who have shaped major events. It can change your perspective of history."

King George III is commonly labeled "mad" or "the king who lost America" according to the Georgian Papers Programme, which hopes releasing the documents will give a new look into a "complex, engaged polymath and highly informed monarch."

The database for the newly released documents has the support of Queen Elizabeth II, who has served as England's longest-serving monarch.

### **Presiding over history**

King George III was king from 1760 to 1820, and ruled over the American colonies until the Treaty of Paris created the US as a separate nation following the American Revolution. Some of the documents included in Saturday's release will involve the revolutionary war.

One of the documents that will be released will be his handwritten draft abdicating the throne in 1783, the year the treaty was signed. The letter was laden with corrections and written during a political crisis.

"I am therefore resolved to resign my Crown and all the dominions appertaining to it to the Prince of Wales, my eldest son and lawful successor," reads the letter which was never used.

Also to be released Saturday are King George III's personal exchanges with Queen Charlotte and the handing of power to his eldest son, King George IV.

### **More to come**

The documents have been stored in the Round Tower of Windsor Castle for more than a century. The tower is a royal residence located west of London.

The documents to be published Saturday are part of an ongoing five year project to digitize more than 350,000 documents in the archives' collection of Georgian papers, covering the reigns of the first four kings named George between 1714-1830.

Welcome to our 51<sup>st</sup> Annual Laguna Beach Patriots Day Parade. Our parade starts at 11 a.m., Saturday, March 4, 2017, at Laguna Beach High School on Park Avenue and Short Street.

Your entry number and lineup area are indicated above (see below for Location Code). Enclosed are parade rules and a map to direct you to your assembly area. It is essential that you CHECK IN and receive numbered armbands or window cards, so that announcers and spectators can identify your entry along the parade route.

Our 2017 Parade theme is "One America". This is a PATRIOTIC EVENT and we suggest an authentic United States flag or red, white and blue in your entry; no altered U.S. flags are allowed.

Band, Novelty and Float awards will be presented following the parade at Tivoli Too, Art a Fair Grounds, 777 Laguna Canyon Road (near the bus parking), and food and drinks will be for sale there. Auto awards will be given prior to and during the Parade. Autos to be judged should be in place by 8:30 a.m.

Please read our Parade rules, especially: NOTHING can be THROWN or passed out from an entry during the Parade—only distributed from the curb. SKATEBOARDS are not allowed; if not under control, they can become "missiles". Please maintain a steady forward march as directed so we won't have any big gaps. BANDS, please play along the Parade route until the "silent" area.

The Parade is not sponsored by the City or any other organization. We are all volunteers and depend on your suggested entry fee, donations and our program advertisers to cover expenses. Please patronize our advertisers.




